4/1/2025 On indicated date and time this officer was performing duties as school resource officer at Groveport-Madison High School. Officer was advised that a fight had taken place in lower Pride Hall between two students. Officer observed the school surveillance video which showed the two students located at the end of Pride Hall. Suspect #1 goes by victim #1 and uses her shoulder to push her from behind. Suspect #1 then comes back to victim #1 and shoves her. Victim throws her drink in response to the physical contact and suspect #1 the starts to punch victim #1. Victim #1 does fight back in protection of herself. A copy of the

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video was saved on a flash drive and entered into Groveport Police evidence. Parent of victim declined to sign assault charges on suspect. Suspect charged with Disorderly conduct.

4/10/2025- student reporting an assault by her father on 4/9/2025 which occurred in the jurisdiction of Columbus Police. Incident taken over by Columbus Division of Police.

4/10/2025-LOCK OUT. Officer gained entry to Vehicle.

4/11/2025-On indicated date and time this officer was performing duties as school resource officer at Groveport Madison High School. Officer was located at south end of school as school was letting out for the end of the school day near the buses. School staff advised that a fight was taking place in the lunch room area of the school. Officer attempted to get to the area but several students were located in the halls. School staff was able to break up the fight and take the two students involved to different areas in the offices. Officer observed school surveillance video of incident which showed Suspect #1 located by door looking back towards students leaving the area. Suspect #2 walks to the area where suspect #1 is located and both parties begin to verbally argue with each other while neither are removing themselves from the area. Both suspects then become involved in a physical fight with several students and staff in the area, School staff and security break up the fight and take both parties to different office areas. Officer charged both suspects with disorderly conduct. A copy of the incident on school surveillance video was saved to a flash drive and entered into Groveport Police evidence.

4/22/2025-On indicated date and time this officer was performing duties as school resource officer at Groveport Madison High School. Officer was standing in rotunda area as students were walking to class between bells. Officer observed three male students in first floor Rarey Hall begin to physically fight with each other. Several staff were attempting to break up the fight but the students continued to fight. This officer warned all parties to stop fight or they would be pepper sprayed. School staff was eventually able to separate all parties involved and they were taken to different areas of the school. Officer observed the school surveillance video of the incident. The video show suspect #1 and #2 approach victim #1 from behind and punch him several times as victim #1 physically defends himself. A copy of the incident was saved on a flash drive and entered into Groveport Police evidence.

4/22/2025-On indicated date and time this officer was performing duties as school resource officer at Groveport Madison High School. Officer was advised a fight between two students had taken place in the lower rotunda. Officer observed school surveillance video. A student standing next to a school security staff as another student approached and started to punch the other student who was physically defending herself. School security was able to break up fight and take the students to different locations. On 5/5/25 the victim's father stated he did not want to pursue charges for assault. This officer charged suspect with disorderly conduct. A copy of the school video was saved to a flash drive and entered into Groveport Police evidence.

4/22/2025- On indicated date and time this officer was performing duties as school resource officer at Groveport Madison High School. Officer was advised that two students were involved in a fight in room 253. Both teachers in the room stated both students mutually engaged in a physical fight causing them to physically separate the students. A school surveillance video outside of the room shows one of the teachers physically restraining one

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other student who was still attempting to fight. Both students were charged with disorderly conduct. A copy of the video was saved on a flash drive and entered into Groveport Police evidence.

### SRO's April Incidents

On 4/1, during student drop off at Groveport Elementary, a suspicious bag was reported in front of MS Central by a parent. Secured location and checked the open bag. The bag contained multiple scanner devices, belonging to Groveport maintenance dept.

On 4/3 at Groveport Elementary a bullet was found on a student. Student was showing it off to his friends. School admin disciplined the student. Officers made several attempts made to contact parent regarding ammo and gun safety but no contact was made. Report taken.



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On 4/3 at MS Central two male students were seen walking from the boy's restrooms, first verbally fighting then shortly after they were physically fighting. One student stated the other slapped him in the restroom. Students involved received discipline by School admin. Report taken, Prosecution declined.

On 4/4 at MS South a special needs student was unable to control his temper. Student was cursing at staff and tempted to leave school grounds. Staff was able to calm the student but later transported him home.

On 4/4 at MS Central a fight occurred on bus ride from school between two girls after being initiated by male student who throw a used/empty soda bottle. The male student claimed, it was someone else but the bus cameras confirmed his involvement. Students involved received discipline by School admin. Report taken.

On 4/10 at MS Central a fight took place inside the girl's bathroom between two female students.

One of the female's involved in the fight purposefully recorded the fight before it began. Fight was believed to be mutual due to text messages between the two, planning/ scheduling to meetup. School admin discipline the students involved. Report taken, no charges filed.

On 4/11 at MS South two sisters were released at their bus stop and attempted to walk home but was allegedly attacked by two other students from the school. The other students took advantage of having a sub bus driver and got off a bus stop that wasn't theirs (unassigned area). Parent filed charges with Columbus PD for assault.

-Spring Break 14th - 21st-

On 4/22 at MS South a student's parent stated that her son was choked out by other student who's been bullying him all year. The parents believed the school is doing nothing to help them get justice and request to involve the police. Incident is being investigated. School admin discipline the students involved. Report taken.

On 4/22 at MS Central two male students were engaging in a conversation via text about fighting each other. One student reported the incident to school admin because he felt threaten when the other student said he would bring a gun to school and shoot him. Students involved received discipline by School admin. Report taken, unknown school decision to press charges at this time.

On 4/23 at MS South a male student purposefully pulled the fire alarm, stating he just did it. No fire was reported nor was the student instructed to do so. School admin discipline the students involved. Report taken, charges filed for DOC.

On 4/24 at MS South a male student stated that he was being bullied by another female and male student. He became frustrated and told the students bullying him, that he was going to have his



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high school brother shoot them. I partnered with the High School SRO's regarding the incident. The High school student was identified and questioned. Threat assessment completed, concluded to be low risk. School admin disciplined the students involved. Report taken, no charges filed.

On 4/25 Patrol officers, Community Liaison officer and myself assisted with student movement during the Arbor Day tree planting event. Glendenning and Groveport Elementary 3rd grade students returned safely to school grounds w/o incident.

On 4/26 at MS Central a female student stated that her step-dad was physically and sexual assaulting her. School provided addition resources that could help the student. Columbus PD responded, Parents contacted. Report Taken.

On 4/29 at MS South a male student stated he grew frustrated with a female student and said that he would kill and murder her. School admin discipline the student involved. Report taken, no charges filed.

On 4/29 at MS South a female student spoke with the school counselor, stating she was struggling with suicide. The student made notes of threatening/ researching ways to end her life and created goodbye notes to family/friends. CID responded and transported the student to Children's Hospital.

School perimeter checks were conducted on 4/22 and 4/30. Admin was made aware of my findings:

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### **Speed Detection Devices-**

During the past month, Ptl. Josh Dillard has been working to deploy the new Radar/Speed Detection Devices in our neighborhoods and highly traveled roadways in the City of Groveport. Thus far the small black boxes have been deployed to give our staff statistics on how much vehicle traffic flows through the area and the average speed of the vehicles traveling in that area.

Ptl. Dillard has also repurposed old speed trailer equipment to utilize the new Radar/Speed Detection Signs. Currently there is a new sign posted in front of Veterans Park, where the trailer is close to 10 years old, but the electronic sign is new, and can have messages posted on the sign to ward drivers about their speed and road hazards.

### **Meetings-**

I attended the Ohio Association Chiefs of Police Conference (OACP) in Downtown Columbus during the last week of April. Over three hundred members of the OACP attended this year's conference over the three-day in-service training. The main topics of discussion for the conference were Labor Relations, State and Federal Funding for public safety training, recruiting struggles and liability issues when it comes to officer's performance in the field. There was a brief equipment/vendor demonstration where we were able to speak with vendors about equipment needs, and one of the main topics is tariffs on foreign made products, along with the increase in pricing that fluctuates in the daily budget. The vendors could not speculate how long or how pricing will be affected for not only the 2025 current budget year, but how to prepare for 2026 budget year preparation.

Captain Blevins and I sat down with Personnel Director Joyce Myers and HR Specialists Annie Short reference the Groveport Police Department Policy & Procedure Manual. During our meeting, Captain Blevins was detailed about how the Lexipol Policy Manual works when it comes to updating our policies when State and Federal Legislation & Court cases have affected our response to certain situations. Captain Blevins also demonstrated how the Groveport Police Department meets the Ohio Collaborative Standards mandated by the State of Ohio Legislative and Executive Branches that were put in place over the past decade. He also demonstrated to the Personnel Department that Lexipol has electronic acknowledgments by our personnel who read and understand our police policies, along with the Daily Training Bulletins where personnel review the policy and answer questions about the policies to demonstrate their true understanding of the policy. This meeting was beneficial to our department and the Personnel Department by demonstrating that policies are read and understood, and then acknowledged by our staff on a continuous basis.





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### **Drone Update-**

As I mentioned in the Meeting Portion of this month's report, I attended the OACP Conference where I was able to speak with vendors who specialize in public safety equipment. With the recent tariff developments, I have been informed that the DJI drone package that was budgeted in 2024 has increased by more than 61% or over \$10,000 increase from the 2025 Capital Budget proposal (\$16,500 original budget to a new rough quote of \$27,000). I spoke to other drone vendors who offer drone equipment, but a lot of these vendors are unproven, require lengthy and more expensive service agreements, or their drone requires launching pads to deploy from a stationary point within the city.

I also spoke with other police administrators who spoke of the vendor DJI and American made drone vendors. From my understanding DJI holds at least 70% of the market in public safety, and the other vendors do not have same customer service when it comes to software and equipment failures requiring repairs. I was also cautioned to watch vendors who utilize software that require continuous updates with the drone and controller, and if the units are not updated at the same time, the drone will fail to take flight. Finally, the DJI drone units have weather resistant standards built into units, and this equipment is necessary when deploying a drone in rain, snow and icy conditions.

I have instructed Captain Blevins and Lt. Short to work with Ptl. James Reed and a Patrol Sergeant to re-evaluate our options when it comes to the drone program and the equipment needed to be operational in the field, and report their findings and possible recommendation to proceed forward.

### **Misc. Equipment Upgrades-**

Ptl. Forrest Benner, Mayor's Court Clerk Rachel Ricker and myself attended a video conference with SOLVE Solutions who works with the State of Ohio on electronic ticketing software and auto accident reporting software. There is no cost for the software, the only cost would be installing printers in patrol vehicles to print out citations for the defendant's copy. I have sent a copy of the contract/user agreement to the City Administrator for review and authorization to proceed forward in the process. If we do proceed, Ptl. Forrest Benner & Sgt. John Westhoven will evaluate the program to ensure that this program would be beneficial to our operations when it comes to traffic citations and accident reports, and the program will also be beneficial to the Groveport Mayor's Court programming/reporting.

The only other equipment note of interest would be in regards to patrol vehicle purchase. Per the 2025 Capital Project, the Groveport Police Department was authorized to purchase a patrol vehicle, which a 2025 Ford Transit Van was purchased in February 2025. We were just informed that the vehicle has been built and ready to be delivered to the police department. Once we receive the van, Sgt. Westhoven will schedule to upfitting of emergency equipment with the installer Parr Public Safety.

### **APRIL POLICY REPORT:**

#### **Deleted Policies:**

- *Policy 331 - Communications with Persons with Disabilities:* this policy be deleted in its entirety. Relevant content related to persons with disabilities has been moved to the new **ADA Compliance Policy**. This policy #331 will be permanently removed from the manual.

- *Policy 338 - Service Animals:* This policy be deleted in its entirety. Relevant content related to service animals has been moved to a new **Service Animals Policy**. This policy will be permanently removed from the manual.

#### **New Policies:**

- ***Policy 344 - ADA Compliance:*** The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for equal access to Groveport Police Department services, programs, and activities for persons with disabilities, in accordance with Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (**ADA**). ○ This policy also includes guidelines to provide effective communication with persons with disabilities. See the Service Animals Policy for guidance on protecting the rights of individuals who use service animals in accordance with the **ADA**.

- ***Policy 345 Service Animals:*** The purpose of this policy is to provide the guidelines necessary to ensure that the rights of individuals who use service animals to assist with disabilities are protected in accordance with Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (**ADA**).

#### **Updated Policies:**

- ***Policy 1008 – Communicable Diseases:*** This policy has been updated because a regulatory action impacted the content. The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) implemented regulations covering the handling and storage requirements for infectious waste. The EPA also implemented requirements for entities that meet requirements for small or large generators as defined in law. Changes include: ○ In EXPOSURE CONTROL OFFICER, content has been updated to include the new requirements, citations have been added, and the Edit Level has been changed from "Best Practice" to "State."
