Legislation:

Madison Street Parking (3rd Reading)

Per our discussion at the August 17 meeting, this legislation will prohibit parking on the west side of Madison Street from the rear exit drive of the post office to Main Street and confirm no parking on the east side of Madison Street for the entire length.

Use Variance for Parcel 185-001361 Requested by Groveport Madison School District (2nd Reading)

Emergency language has been added to this ordinance per Council's direction at the Sept. 28 meeting. The School is requesting both 2nd and 3rd readings at today's meeting.

Waiver of Fees for Groveport Madison School District (1st Reading)

The Supt. requested Council consider waiver of internal fees for their construction projects. This emergency legislation has been drafted based on waiver of types of fees since the amount of fees are currently not known.

Authorize Administrator to Bid and Execute Contracts for Wellfield Improvements (1st Reading)

This project will purchase and install a permanent generator at the well field, with installation of a gas line to feed the generator for power. This project is included in our 2015 Appropriations. We delayed the project until after completion of the water treatment plant.

Health Services Contract with Franklin County Health District (1st Reading)

The contract applies to our normal services, and includes a 5% cost increase to \$42,058.66.

Heritage & Preservation Society

The deed for the donation of land on Wirt Rd to the society has been finalized. The lease for the museum at Town Hall has been signed.

Food Pantry

The lease for 595 Cherry St. has been signed.

Toy Road

Steve Farst and I attended a meeting hosted by Sen. Bacon at the statehouse regarding the issues related to Toy Road. The meeting was attended by representatives of Madison Township, Village of Obetz, MORPC, Franklin County Engineers, ODOT, residents of the area, and Sen. Bacon's office. Short term and long term solutions were discussed. Most short-term solutions brought up have already been discussed. The two residents in attendance are still wanting to close Toy Road; however, all are entities are against this for several reasons. Madison Township explained that the safety services are very opposed to this idea. MORPC will be starting their study soon; study to take 12 to 18 months because transportation needs is just one of several pieces of the study for the entire Rickenbacker area. Most at the meeting feel this study, which will provide long-term solutions, should be completed so that short-

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term solutions are not counter-productive to the long-term ones. Once the MORPC study is complete, the entities agreed to work together to find funding sources to assist in these improvements, such as joint OPWC applications.
